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| AZ 1 | Colorado River Indian Tribes | <p>The Recovery Act - Renovation of Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands Discretionary Grant Program assists tribes in developing strategies to cost effectively construct or renovate existing facilities associated with the incarceration and rehabilitation of juvenile and adult offenders subject to tribal jurisdiction. Careful planning is critical to ensure that new and renovated correctional facilities are appropriately designed for the intended population, supportive of cultural and traditional values, safe and secure when completed, and are in compliance with appropriate standards regarding correctional operations, programs, and design. The Colorado River Indian Tribes (CRIT) will use the Recovery Act Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands (Category I: Construction of Detention Facilities for Adult and Juvenile Offenders) to construct and establish a new juvenile detention facility to hold and house tribal juveniles who have been taken into custody for violations of tribal law. In 2004, CRIT was required (Per BIA) to remove juveniles from their adult corrections facility because the juveniles area did not provide sight and sound separation from the adult population. Since then, the tribe has been forced to transport their juvenile offenders to a BIA facility in Towaoc, Colorado, which is over twelve hours away from the reservation. In 2006, CRIT received an Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG) from HUD, in which the tribe used the available funds for architectural and engineering (A/E) services to design a new juvenile facility. Recovery Act funds will allow the tribe to complete the project and operate its own juvenile detention facility on the reservation. CRIT will utilize the established team and build upon the strategy which entails: the final review of the facility design; development of construction documents, plans and specifications; construction of the facility; completing the development of policies and procedures for the facility; the hiring and training of detention facility staff; and the opening of the juvenile detention facility. The three biggest problems facing the White Mountain Apache Tribe's Department of Corrections (DOC) are: (1) lack of bed and holding space, (2) inability to properly classify and segregate offenders/defendants by risks and needs, and (3) unpaved parking lots, fire access roads and outdoor inmate recreational areas. The renovation will: add 12 male and 10 female beds which will be used for day and weekend release programs; pave 95,670 square feet that will include two parking lots and a fire access road, and add 14,000 square feet of recreational area for adult and juvenile inmates. The Native Village of Kwinhagak (NVK), under Category II, will construct a Multi-Purpose Justice Center. This center will improve the capacity of the tribal police as well as community-based prevention and intervention services. Specifically, the matching funds (\$150,000) will cover the design and planning stage of construction. The federal contribution will be used to hire a project director, to cover travel costs for BJA trainings, and to purchase equipment, office supplies, insurance, contracts, and construction costs. 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| AZ 1 | Navajo Nation Dept. of Public Safety- Kayenta Community | The Recovery Act - Renovation of Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands Discretionary Grant Program assists tribes in developing strategies to cost effectively construct or renovate existing facilities associated with the incarceration and rehabilitation of juvenile and adult offenders subject to tribal jurisdiction. Careful planning is critical to ensure that new and renovated correctional facilities are appropriately designed for the intended population, supportive of cultural and traditional values, safe and secure when completed, and are in compliance with appropriate standards regarding correctional operations, programs, and design. The Navajo Nation Department of Public Safety will use the Recovery Act Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands (Category I: Construction of Detention Facilities for Adult and Juvenile Offenders) award to construct a facility to be built in Kayenta, Arizona, which is the northwestern region of the Navajo reservation. The Master Plan, completed in March 2007, entails a strategy for: increasing jail beds; providing community-based correctional alternatives; pre-trial and probation services; substance abuse and mental health screening and assessments; treatment and rehabilitation services; a medical room for physical health; traditional family reunification services; educational services; and aftercare services to reduce recidivism. The Department of Corrections will work with an existing executive team to design and construct the proposed multi purpose center using the Program Logic Model and Planning of New Institutions (PONI) process. Through this project, the tribe expects to address the rate of unpunished criminals due to the lack of correctional options, decrease the recidivism rate through rehabilitation services, and create and preserve jobs through the construction of the facility. The Rosebud Sioux Tribe will use the Recovery Act Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands Program (Category 1: Construction of Detention Facilities for Adult and Juvenile Offenders) award to construct an adult correctional facility with enhanced capacity and one that supports the cultural traditions of rehabilitation of the incarcerated. The tribe's current 66 bed adult facility is nearly 30 years old, deteriorating, lacks a custody and classification system, and is unsafe for both inmates and staff. Due to the limited bed space, law enforcement and the courts are forced to release individuals serving sentences for lesser crimes, those awaiting process, and is unable to house drug and alcohol-related offenders, individuals on open warrants, and other criminals who commit crimes for the lack of adequate housing. The absence of an inmate classification system creates the inability to adequately separate prisoners and poses a potential threat to the entire population. The new facility proposes to contain dedicated housing for inmates requiring separation for medical related issues (infectious diseases) and special management, and will enable the administration of rehabilitative programs. The Rosebud Sioux Tribe has established an Executive Level Project Planning Team, who will serve as the focal point for the overall planning process. The newly constructed facility will provide rehabilitative programs and services such as education, counseling, alcohol prevention, cultural preservation programs, value based cultural teachings, suicide prevention, and faith based programming. | MT 3 | Confederated Salish Kootenai Tribes | The Recovery Act - Renovation of Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands Discretionary Grant Program assists tribes in developing strategies to cost effectively construct or renovate existing facilities associated with the incarceration and rehabilitation of juvenile and adult offenders subject to tribal jurisdiction. Careful planning is critical to ensure that new and renovated correctional facilities are appropriately designed for the intended population, supportive of cultural and traditional values, safe and secure when completed, and are in compliance with appropriate standards regarding correctional operations, programs, and design. The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes will use its Recovery Act Correctional Facilities award to improve the booking and processing areas, improve the corridors to increase safety, and address security issues due to the risk of fires at their jail. The Tribes' jail facilities have experienced increases in the number of people processed every year since 2005. This increase is expected to continue at least through 2010. Offenders are being booked and released due to jail overcrowding, and the applicant states that 70 percent of offenders are released due to lack of space. The project will improve spaces for jail staff and inmates. It will allow for a dedicated space for prisoners to meet with advocates or family, which was previously not available as the booking room was also used to serve this function. Booking spaces will also be updated by adding a sally port and cells. The port provides security as prisoners are moved from cars to booking. The port area will also serve as an exercise area during the winter and will be utilized in emergency evacuations if a fire were to occur in the detention area. In addition, to address risks from fire, a fire alarm and sprinklers will be added. Without these items, any fire at the facility could spread quickly, as the facility has a wooden ceiling and roof. Construction costs will also be done for a laundry room, as the current facility has the washer and dryer in opposite sides of the building due to the overall lack of space in the facility and the need to utilize every available space as a result. Construction will also be done to add storage and mechanical space. The award will also be used to address access through the facility by constructing corridors. Showers for prisoners who need to be cleaned for processing are located in the center of the building and the only way to reach those is by going outside, through communications, or through the kitchen. 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| | | corridors that the judges use to get to offices. When moving prisoners, facility staff are also concerned about the glass door they have to pass, which has an emergency open crash bar. Some offenders have tried to escape when passing. Prisoners also have climbed the fence in the exercise yard. Doors will be installed here and in other locations to increase security, and construction of the fence will also be done so that these issues are addressed. In addition to the added benefits of security, renovations from this project will also improve the ability of social services to serve the incarcerated population. CA/NCF | |

The Navajo Nation completed a Master Plan for facilities in March 2007. This plan was completed with a vision of increasing the number of detention beds, but also to: provide community-based alternatives to jail sentences; provide pre-trial and probation services, substance abuse and mental health screening and assessment, treatment and rehabilitation services; and ensure physical health of prisoners, traditional family reunification services and educational services. The goal of this project is to construct the TCMPJ to implement this “vision” and to reduce recidivism rates of re-arrests and incarcerations on the Navajo Nation. This will be accomplished by providing program space to provide a wide range of culturally appropriate services to the inmate population from pre-trial services, alternatives to incarceration, services while individuals are serving time in jail and through day reporting and programs. In addition to this, the Nation will be able to provide aftercare services to prevent relapses and re-incarceration. Constructing the TCMPJ will begin to address the breakdown in the Navajo public safety system due to the extreme lack of jail beds. 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| | | <p>Chehalis Reservation will use its Recovery Act Renovation of Correctional Facilities award to add an electronic security system for their wing for female inmates, provide a door between the court clerk's office and the tribal court, and add a raised platform in the courtroom for the judges' area, court clerk's chair, and the witness stand. The women's facility at the Chehalis Public Safety Facility currently utilizes a manual security system. The men's facility has an existing electronic security system which will be expanded for the women's facility. The facility's existing control room is utilized to monitor the security system and the door to that room will be updated from a digital lock to a proximity reader. This will allow staff to move quickly during an emergency. The grantee will also purchase digital video recorders, channel multiplexers, and an LCD monitor to expand video recording and display capabilities. This system will accommodate the expanded area of coverage that the system will have upon adding the women's facility. Construction costs will include installation of the security system in the women's wing. The wing is currently under construction, which except for the installation of the security system is funded by another source. Improvements to the courtroom, which adjoins the corrections component of the Chehalis Facility, will include adding a door between the court clerk's office and the courtroom. Although the office and the courtroom share a wall, the current map of the building requires travel from one to the other by going down two hallways and through a secure doorway. This delays the court clerk in accessing court records for the judge. The costs for this construction will include demolition of the wall and installing a metal door frame, and the metal door itself. The courtroom will also be enhanced by adding a raised platform for the judge's chair, court clerk's chair, and the witness stand. This project will also include building a rail that will be around the elevated platform. One row of courtroom seating will be removed for this project, which will provide a more secure environment, particularly when inmates are being transferred in and out of the courtroom.
